One thing about winters in Virginia, they always seem to be one for the record book. This winter is ending with the warmest February since 1874! It has been nice to see many golfers out enjoying the course during this mild winter Maintenance crew has had very few days off due to inclement weather. Now that have jinxed us, you can yell at me for the weather we get in March and April. We have managed to get a bit of work done on the course this winter.

Our priorities were edging bunkers and clearing many overgrown areas. The clearing really opened up some views and hopefully will help the speed of play in some areas. We have been getting a lot of comments on of our bunker edges, regarding the lack of putt-ability out of green side bunkers.

A few important tips from *Curt* Corey in club fitting:

I) Measure your height. Clubs are matched to your height and the distance between your hands and the ground. To find the right size clubs for your body, it usually helps to have another person help measure to get the most accurate measurements possible. Measure your basic height from the top of your head to the bottom of your feet. Stand up as straight as possible. You do not need to be in your swing stance.

2) Measure your wrist-floor length. Stand as straight as possible and ask your helper to measure from the top of your wrist, where the top of the club would be, to the floor.

3) Provide your handicap or a basic description of your skill level. One of the most common reasons for people to buy off the rack is that they say, "I'm not good enough for a custom club." In fact, clubs that fit you better can drastically help improve your game.

4) Determine your swing speed if possible. You can have this done by hitting balls in front of an electronic launch monitor. In general, people with faster swings prefer stiff shafts on their woods and irons. People with slower speeds are more likely to prefer more flexible shafts in their woods and irons.

5) Ball flight is another important factor in choosing which flex would be best for you. Sometimes it's best to have your experienced pro help make your decision in which shaft is best for you. So many choices these days.

I honestly believe that most people's (90%) swing shafts are too stiff. It is important that your swing speed allows the club to load and kick through impact. A well fitted shaft can really help your game with distance and accuracy. However, it cannot help with the swing path. That is something that I would love to help you out with. Give me a call to schedule a lesson or two.
